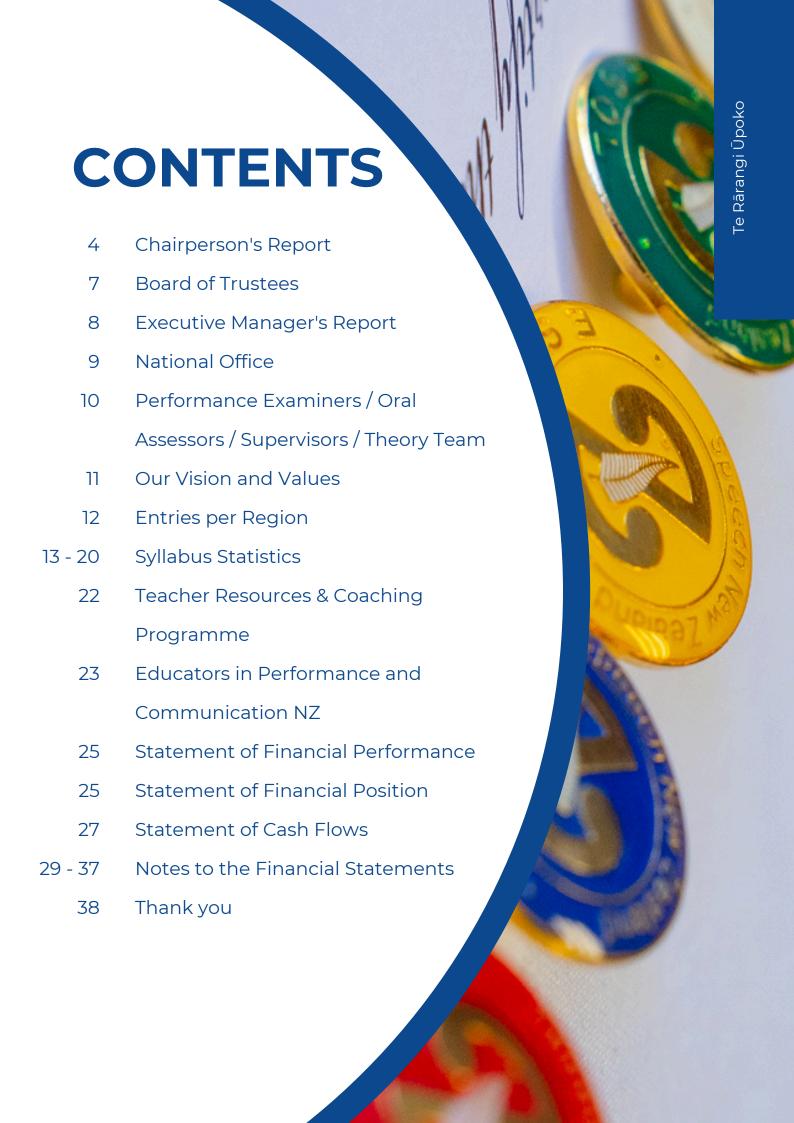

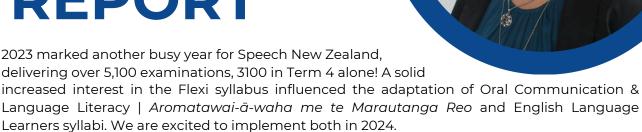

EXECUTIVE MANAGER'S REPORT



Professional development of our community was a major focus for 2023 with classes in cultural capability (deficit theorising and unconscious bias), and te reo Māori, (beginner and intermediate), offered to our staff, trustees, examiners and supervisors. Educators in Performance and Communication (EPC) ran four online workshops and an online professional development seminar on *Embracing Diversity Through Communication* with five notable facilitators.

The Future Teacher Coaching Programme remains available for new or growing teachers looking to gain skills relevant to their business practice or Speech New Zealand syllabi. Our library of Teacher Resources continues to grow with Reading Aloud, Drama Skills and Poetry released in 2023 and Talks, Storytelling and Impromptu to be released in 2024.

As we look to the future needs of Aotearoa in oral communication, our team has grown to build capacity. Jaime Winter joined in April to fill the role of Exam Administrator, and worked alongside Claire Tanner to coordinate tours. Kelly Gilbride joined as our Marketing and Sponsorship Coordinator in June, and has been integral to the development of a clear marketing plan for our newly revised syllabi. Katie Jackson joined in October as the Accounts and Office Administrator, and coordinates accounts payable, accounts receivable and payroll. Four new examiners completed training in 2023 with another six at various stages of their training. We welcome a total of 25 new teachers to Speech New Zealand.

The development of our online Communication in Leadership programme was successfully delivered to six students in 2023. This programme provides an opportunity for students anywhere in New Zealand to gain expert training in public speaking as they aim for leadership roles in their schools, churches, community groups or sports teams.

The Board of Trustees and National Office are grateful for the continued support of our teachers, businesses and wider community in ensuring the best possible outcomes for our students in 2023! We are excited to look at further improvements and refinement in processes as we head in to 2024 and what the years ahead may hold.
