After teaching a Professional Speaking for Migrants course for 11 years in Rotorua, Speech NZ Trustee Margriet Theron delivered this course in 2021 via Zoom to ten overseas qualified General Practitioners who are working as doctors in New Zealand. They undertook the course, supported by the Royal New Zealand College of General Practitioners, in preparation of a practical College examination where they will be assessed on their ability to communicate with Kiwi patients. They all gained the Speech NZ Certificate in Professional Speaking after a Zoom examination taken by Del Costello.





The Future Teacher Coaching Programme

The board was very excited to execute part of its strategic plan by launching the pilot run of the Future Teacher Coaching Programme.

We had recognised that throughout the country there was a shortage of Speech, Drama and Communication teachers, both in the marketplace and entering exams into our syllabi. The strategy behind this project is to support succession planning for the whole industry and to allow us to fill our vision of helping our nation to communicate.

The pilot run has been a success. There were nine participants enrolled with seven pilot coaches delivering the coaching. Twenty-one modules have been completed and 24 modules are ongoing over the holidays.

Once the pilot project is complete, a full evaluation will be done of its impact, including extensive feedback from the pilot participants, and any changes or iterations that need to be completed will be done in consultation with the Speech New Zealand board. It is our goal to launch the future teacher training programme into the wider market in the first quarter of 2022.

This is an exciting opportunity for teachers at all levels of experience to grow and develop businesses that support our vision.

Winning artwork

Shannon Sawyers, a year 12 student at Havelock North High School, won our art competition with this piece. It is now displayed in the National Office in Wellington. Below is Shannon's description:

"I based my concept on partnership, credibility and empowerment.

Partnership: I have shown this with the nesting of a child's hands inside guiding adults. I have ensured diversity of both age and ethnicity in my design to show Speech NZ is available for people with all backgrounds.

Credibility: I have chosen an egg symbol, as it has a strong, protective shell, and could nurture growing skills inside.

Empowerment: I decorated the egg in koru and other symbols based on Maori culture. These symbols appear to be glowing from within to portray the empowerment they can give to the holders. Speech NZ's logo is also discreetly placed in the egg's symbols."

Teacher Workshops

We held some fantastic Teacher Workshops in 2021, covering topics such as: Teaching Drama, Teaching Impromptu Tasks, Teaching the Flexi Syllabus, Teaching English Language Learners, and Teaching for Viva Voce. The recordings for all of these workshops can be found on our website.
