#### MRS BARBARA LAURENSON

In the early 1990s, I was teacher in charge of a Special Needs Unit at a boys' secondary school in Wellington.

The unit consisted of 18 students with a range of intellectual disability, two teachers, and several teacher aides. The students' needs ranged from moderate to very high. Some students were alomst entirely mainstreamed, while others spent the majority of their days on special programmes in the unit.

Several of our students were non-verbal. Two or three used basic sign language to communicate. We decided to involve as many of the students as possible regardless of ability or disability. We asked Speech New Zealand if they would widen the scope of the term 'oral' to allow the participation of a candidate's teacher aide/interpreter into the assessment. Ted White, director of SNZ at the time, agreed. In the end, we devised ways for all but three of the students to take part.

The process of preparation required energy, commitment and creativity from the teachers and aides, to problem solve both communication and physical challenges.

Levels of interaction and a range of communication skills broadened. The required drama presentation allowed some students to reveal hitherto unknown talents and an enthusiasm for performance. It was increasingly clear to us all that there was a great deal more to 'communication' than just 'oral.'

#### ASHLEIGH GULLIVER

'Speech New Zealand' was always a term that held great power in my mind. Growing up it was the examining body – examiners always tucked away in the school chapel, and me, a bundle of nerves behind the doors waiting to be ushered in. I was always met with a smile, and, with pride would then present the exam work I had spent so long preparing. Following the exam I would run back to my teacher to debrief and share the questions we were asked along with any impromptu exercise topics. There was a buzz as we waited patiently over the coming days to receive our handwritten exam reports; beautiful cursive handwriting that would need to be translated for us.

I was privileged to be approached in 2009 to join the Board as a Trustee, and I proudly sat around the table at my first Board meeting in awe of the other Trustees, many of whom had been my examiners over the years.

Sir Isaac Newton once said, "If I have seen further, it is by standing on the shoulders of giants." Gabrielle Thurston, Pam Logan, Claire Marsh, Meredith Caisley, Helen Balch, Karen Austin, and Maureen Gray – I thank you for being beside me on this journey, and for being instrumental figures in not only my life, but that of Speech New Zealand.

## FORTY-EIGHT YEARS OF COLLEGIALITY

Retiring examiner, Mrs Meredith Caisley, reflects on her time with Speech NZ

When my Mother drove me to my very first elocution lesson in 1954, neither of us could have imagined how that single moment would set the course for the rest of my life. I sat Grade 3 at the end of that year and failed. I often think of J.K. Rowling's inspiring words during her address to graduating students of Harvard University "The Fringe Benefits of Failure and the Importance of Imagination". She said "Having the courage to fail is as vital to a good life as any conventional measure of success; imagining ourselves into the place of another... is a uniquely human quality to be nurtured at all costs." I am not sure that it was courage that I experienced at my first failure but certainly I imagined myself into becoming an examiner for the New Zealand Speech Board by 1976. That appointment shaped a vibrant and rewarding career I have cherished ever since.

Three years earlier, I had one of the most defining moments of my teaching career, the visit of Christabel Burniston, the late Director of the English Speaking Board with which our Association of Teachers of Speech and Drama (ATSD) became affiliated. I had the privilege of holding a masterclass conducted by her in my own Studio in Auckland. I treasure her book 'Speech for Life' signed by her along with John Thomson, one of the founders of ATSD and Wallace Allen who examined me for my FTCL.

My career has brought with it endless enriching challenges across New Zealand. Two in particular stand out: being welcomed onto a Marae in the far north accompanied by Hazel Menehira prior to examining her students, an awesome ceremony in the days long before Kiwis understood the tradition; and examining auctioneers standing in the Cambridge stables where Claire Marsh taught, with racehorses as the visual aids.

The 48 years of collegiality has been a treasured feature. Inevitably I was in awe of the founding examiners such as Rhona Davis, Berwyn Gibbons and Melda Townsley in the days when the Examiners' Decision was final, but meeting and befriending examiners at the annual Accreditation Seminars melded us together as our whānau. It was the highlight of our year to be able to work and play together for three days each year having our spirits refreshed and our community strengthened. That also gave us the opportunity to meet and listen to the driving force of our entity, our Administrators. Some of you reading this will remember Ted White, our long-serving Administrator who termed himself "the Servant of the Board" but actually ruled with the authority of a Navy commander.

Although I am retiring from the field, I remain a life-time member of Speech New Zealand and am pleased to welcome our up-coming examiners proud to assist New Zealanders to develop versatility in the use of language, oral presentation and performance skills.

## FAREWELL TO MEREDITH

Meredith is one of Speech New Zealand's icons. She began teaching at the age of 17, entered students in Speech New Zealand exams, served as a trustee on the Board and examined for decades. Among her many students she taught her daughter in law, Stephanie Caisley who is both a SNZ teacher and examiner. She then went on to teach her two twin granddaughters Emma and Jaqueline who are now speech teachers. While Meredith is retiring from examining, we still have her legacy.

I first met Meredith at an accreditation seminar in the 90's at Frederick Wallis House. While on our compulsory early morning walk up some bush clad hill we had our first chat. One of Meredith's great strengths was that she was upfront and 'told it like it was.' Meredith had the courage to always embrace change and this was so beneficial to Speech New Zealand.

Meredith travelled the length of New Zealand many times on examining tours. In 1976 she joined the Board as a trustee and was appointed Theory Moderator. I was one of her theory examiners and grew to realise that Meredith ran a tight ship. We would dread the papers being returned with her markings and comments but it was a great learning curve. Whenever, a famous person makes a significant speech I always think of Meredith as public speaking was her forte. Meredith was very loyal to Speech New Zealand and would always fulfil her examining contracts and do extra when required.

Speech New Zealand will miss Meredith's wisdom, loyalty, flexibility and infectious laughter. She has been an important person in the shaping of Speech New Zealand.
